Those in progress include: Camp Dodge, Early History of Johnston Cemeteries, Johnston Fire Department, and the Fruitland-Brennan Improvement League.

Still needed are volunteers to research the following: Early Businesses, Johnston School History; Johnston Churches, Johnston Clubs, Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Johnston Pioneers, and the Geologic History, including the Saylorville Gorge.

Sycamore Park

Located on the west bank of the Des Moines River, and on the south side of Kempton Drive, Sycamore Park was one of the attractions of the Johnston area in the 1920's, '30's and 40's. People came from Des Moines and the surrounding area to enjoy its facilities. The name "Sycamore Park" appeared on an arched sigh over the entrance drive, and the grounds were shaded by a fine grove of mature sycamore trees.

The park featured a large frame dance pavilion, painted white, with shutters along the sides which could be raised to open the building to the outdoors, and to let in the air (and no doubt mosquitoes). In addition, there was a typical round covered bandstand on the grounds. The dance pavilion was recognized for its fine dance floor, and local bands played on Saturday nights for public dancing during the summer. Occasionally a "name" band would appear. The park was owned by a Mr. Sample.


In addition to dances, Sycamore Park was used by various social, civic and trade groups such as the Lumbermen's Association, for gatherings, and for many years the end-of-the year school picnics for the Johnston Schools, a tradition of the times, were held there. Since the building was close to the river, and in the flood plain, it was vulnerable to any serious flooding over the years.

Sycamore Park was still in use as late as the end of the 1940's, but by the 1950's the building was somewhat derelict. It was finally abandoned, and the underbrush took over. After the town of Johnston was incorporated, an effort was made, by the city parks and recreation board, the Johnston Garden Club, and other interested citizens, to clean up the area. They installed picnic tables with the hope that it would serve as a local park and picnic site. But problems with vandalism, and the prospect of flooding in future, led to the area being abandoned once more.

In August of 1927 a rodeo appeared at Sycamore Park. It was sponsored by "a man from Collins": "Carr's Rodeo, One Day Only-- Featuring Jimmy Nesbit"!

Bessie Carlson- at that time Bessie Lundstrom-, who had attended and graduated from Johnston High School was a good horsewoman. As a matter of fact she had frequently ridden her horse to Johnston School from her home in Crocker Township, on the east side of the Des Moines river.

Bessie entered the rodeo competition. She rode the bucking bronco, and in her own words," got throwed, hit on my head & didn't get hurt."! Bessie says that the rodeo encamped at the park for several days. Later in that month it appeared at the Dexfield Park (in Dexter, IA) and Bessie, nothing daunted, again entered, and rode a steer. No report on how she did!

Today the site of Sycamore Park can be found by the approach over a culvert (installed when the road level was raised, and a new bridge constructed in the 1950's), located on the south side of Kempton Drive (N.W. 66th Ave.) just west of the Des Moines River bridge. The "Park" is now a designated wildlife refuge under the protection of the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.
