As we all know, one good thing frequently leads to another. After Bob Simon, of the Urbandale Historical Society gave us a program on Merle Hay Road and the man, Merle Hay, we used his resources to create a power point slide presentation. His same resources were used to create a display for one of the cases at City Hall. Shirley Schleihs Adams used her artistic talents to design and arrange the display. We are fortunate to have her share her gift.

Shirley has also met repeatedly with and interviewed Ethel Coan, from the class of 1925. Ethel subsequently has donated countless memorabilia relating to her school years. One thing of interest is some notebook pages with Johnston cheerleading cheers from the '20's.

limit was up to the late '50's. Lois Wagner has expressed an interest in continuing the process under Dick's tutelage. We continue to scour the newspaper for obituaries of Johnston interest. Johnston alumni can be researched on the computer that we have in the "school" room.

Mary Jones, an environmental specialist at Camp Dodge, has given us a power point that she created about some of the historical and environmental aspects of Camp Dodge.

The Presbyterian Church that was south of the Ridgedale Cemetery and functioned from 1889 to 1919 was another project that led to good things. Ray Schleihs donated the wooden sign that had hung over the front door of the church. Interviews and research led us to further questions. The building had been moved and used for many years as a home for numerous families. When the home was on the market, Bob Thomas contacted the owner and received permission to visit the building. We found the original archway that had encased a window over the front door of the church. Since the house was to be destroyed, we were lucky to be able to rescue the archway and some native timber that had been used in the joists of the building. We now have a display with a picture of the church, a picture of the house, and a written explanation of the history – all enclosed in the archway. Some of the research for this display was from the abstracts of Hyperion Field Club. We are making a copy of the abstracts for future reference, thanks to John Ausen from Hyperion.

The City of Johnston has given us a copy of a set of aerial photos on a disc that shows the watershed rea of Beaver Creek. The photos are stunning and a good resource for research. They can be viewed on the Society computer.

We received a grant of \$2000 that will be paid quarterly from BRAVO, the Greater Des Moines Community Foundation. This money is earmarked for equipment to edit and display our video creations. With the donations received from Wes Jordan and Denny Elwell, along with a grant from Sam's Club, we have purchased an excellent digital video camera along with microphones. We also purchased an iMAC computer that allows us to edit the videos. We are taking classes at the Apple Store in West Des Moines to learn all the capabilities of this computer. So far we have made video interviews with Fran Sandregren Badgley, Bill Brown with Ferne Michael, Mary McPherson, Jim Thomas and Ray Schleihs. As we continue to become more comfortable with the equipment we will make more videos.

We were asked by the Urbandale Historical Society to give a presentation on the History of Johnston in February. This really pushed us along. The resources that we have been accumulating at the museum have been a big help. We have a power point slide show ready to be screened at our next meeting for our members to give input and suggestions before the final unveiling at the Urbandale meeting. The Johnston Lions Club wants to see the presentation also for its Feb. meeting. As you can see — one good thing has definitely led to another.


