A MEMBER WRITES: "I am a member of the Johnston (Station) Historical Society and enjoy the newsletters so much. They bring back so many old memories. In the latest (May) letter in the "Old Timers Tidbit) the "watermelon hunting" was mentioned. My fathers watermelon patch, just off Merle Hay Road was the biggest in Johnston. He had 48 acres in melons and had to hire a guard at night to keep the "hunters" away. I was the one to lead the kids into the area the guard couldn't see. My folks had greenhouses in Johnston for many years and sold flower and vegetable plants to everyone in the area. I was born and raised in Johnston at 6217 Merle Hay Rd. My sisters (Marie '23; Susie '34 and Josephine '35) all graduated from Johnston. I haven't been back since the museum has been created. ANOTHER MEMBER WRITES:

"I recall that during the early part of WWII my brother Johnny and occasionally my Dad worked at a machine shop on the road immediately east of Merle Hay in what we called the acreages. The owner of the shop was Gus Edmunds and his wife Leona - they had a toddler son but I forget his name. This could relate to a persistent story that has been running in the Dayton Daily News. The latest was "Local Manhattan project must start itself", 6-2-06, by Martin Gottlieb (937-225-2288 or mgottlieb@DaytonDailyNews.com The story refers also to Los Alamos, NM; Oak Ridge, TN and Hanford, WA. The object of Mr. Gottlieb's article was pertaining to the establishment of a National Park and of course Dayton was an early player in the project to build an atomic bomb. I had a conversation with an individual who had actually worked on the top secret project here in Dayton. I confess to a mild interest in this matter. Is there any body of information on a Johnston connection???

(You can see that I copied Marc Hansen on this note.) We shall see what we shall see.

I thought of another piece of Johnston history. There use to be a tire swing in the timber behind what we called Cruikshank's pasture Northeast of the Y-Boy's Home, It hung on a cable from a large tree and the ride was breath-taking. It swung out over a deep ravine and you could look down att the stream and ditch 30-40 feet below. One day I was at Hyperion supposedly to caddy and when I mentioned this swing no one believed me so I offered to show them. A group of us walked into that pasture and at first no one wanted to try it. I took a ride on it and one kid didn't want to admit that he was afraid but his reaction was priceless at least to me. I learned later that it had broken down but that no one was hurt when it occurred. I have no idea how long it was there. Only that my family used to go up to cut firewood and it was an outing for us all. My mother made it a picnic and she would look for asparagus or mushrooms in their seasons. We used the wood in our wood burning water heater which my dad would fire up for our bathes. I don't know who besides me knew of the swing, but I understood it to have been put there by Clyde Hunt or his relatives."
