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President's Column

May, 2007

Just in time for our annual meeting in April, we received word from Polk County Supervisor E. J. Giovannetti that we had been awarded \$1,500 to be used toward the residing of the Simpson House. This is a good beginning of the final step to complete the museum. Ever since Vern and Shirley Simpson donated the house to us, we have worked so very hard to accomplish what we have. Two years ago at this time, we were putting the finishing touches with curtains and a staircase runner. We have since put our energies to accessions, displays and historical research.

The present Masonite siding was placed over a tar paper like siding that is covering the original cedar clapboard siding. At some point, the original wooden storm windows were discarded and replaced with aluminum combination windows. Some of the aluminum windows don't fit the opening and some are missing the storm window part of the frame. We have talked to numerous contractors about our options to replace the siding and storm windows. Each one has a different angle and creates more questions than answers. The costs vary between \$15,000 to \$30,000 depending on choice of products.

We have a year to accomplish this task and use the Polk County Community Betterment Grant. No matter what choice of siding and windows we end up with, we will need to seriously raise some funds to finish this project.

On a lighter note, I'd like to tell you about our plans for Johnston Green Days, June 14th through the 16th. On Thursday evening, the 14th, there will be an opportunity to enjoy a "Taste of Johnston" from 5:30 to 8:00. A movie, "Night in the Museum" will be shown in the library from 6:00 to 8:00. From 8:00 to 10:00, the Society will host a concert in the barn with Brenda Smith and Bluegrass Round-Up. Brenda says the group is excited about being part of Green Days and will surely have you grinnin' and tappin' your toes in the Barn!

On Saturday, the 16th, starting at 10:00 a.m., be sure to watch for Judy Bogaard & Virginia McGinn with the "Betz Brothers" accommodating JSHS members on their tractor/trailer combo in the parade. From noon on, the museum will be open for tours and kids will be working with our volunteers on crafts in the barn.

The Johnston (Station) Historical Society is fortunate to have both the Simpson House and The Barn, along with the windmill, on its site. After reading an item in the newspaper about the fact that perhaps 70 percent of lowa citizens over the age of 65 have lived on a farm, I was reminded of the big part the barn played in early rural life.

The barn was the place where many activities took place. Besides being where cattle, horses, even poultry and pigs were housed, there was place for storage of

grain (the granary) as well as the loft where the hay (loose or in bales, round and/or square in later years) as well as a 'milk room' where the cream separator was located. In my estimation, it was an honor to be entrusted with the cleaning of this apparatus after its use every morning. Not only was it fun to clean out the residue (which the cats clamored for), but it was equally fun to stack those shiny, silvery discs in a pyramid to dry.

In earlier times, the barn was perhaps built first and the family occupied a small portion of the building until such time as the house could be built. Barns come in a variety of styles - we see round, crib, prairie, bank, Dutch, to name a few of the styles built. In lowa, we are fortunate to have the lowa Barn Foundation which is focused on preserving some of these structures as 'working barns'.

Many of us recall hearing of the social event known as a "barn raising" when families gathered together to put the rafters in place and complete the barn. A common occurrence upon completion was a barn dance. At the time of those early barn raisings there was abundant food, fun and 'neighboring'.

Having grown up on a farm, I recall playing in the barn - whether it was crawling up and over pens and stalls, playing with the cow stanchions, swinging from a rope tied high from the peak of the barn, making a fort within the hay by burrowing into the high piles, or jumping from the platform along one end of the barn into the piles of hay far below. When moved to its present site, our Barn included a basketball hoop at one end where the young Simpson lads had hours of fun shooting baskets and playing 'horse' with their friends. The 'hoop' now resides with one who cherishes so many memories of those times.

Summertime meant putting the hay in the loft by means of a hayrack with three sling-loads of hay on it or with the use of a hay fork, (sometimes with actual horse power, other times with mechanical horse power known as the tractor). Each sling or fork-full of hay was raised to the level of the peak of the barn, where it then followed a track into the loft. The 'trip' let the hay drop at the appropriate place and whoever was fortunate enough to be in the loft to level off the hay got to go to work. It the load was baled, there was a pyramid of bales places on the sling, hooked and raised through the hay loft door to be dropped with a 'thud' to the floor, then to be stacked and stored for an entire winters' food. Since this method was stressful to the floor and joists of the loft floor, bales were mostly lifted to the loft by means of a grain elevator. Straw from the oats harvest was also baled and stored for bedding, though often stacked in some place other than the loft of the barn.

Barn doors were often halved to serve the purpose of letting light and air in while containing the animals within the structure. Many stories can be shared about these grand old structures with so much character and grand style. Certainly the barn was the most important out-building on the farm.

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When you have come to the edge of all the light you know. And are about to step off into the darkness of the unknown, Faith is knowing one of two things will happen:

There will be something solid to stand on or you will be taught to fly.
