This means that we have the money to move the house and barn and get them situated on foundations.

It also means that we have to work harder to raise funds to complete the project. We

have heard from many of you but we need to hear from many more.

For the past four weeks, a number of local members have worked at the house and barn to prepare them both for the move. It has been awesome to see the checklist of "things to do" turn into a list of "all done"! Herculean tasks have been accomplished. We can be justifiably proud of the expertise we have in our membership.

Local merchants have also supported our efforts. Subway, Hy-Vee, and Breadeaux Pizza have encouraged us with donated food for the workers. Aristic Waste Services donated the use of a roll-off refuse container.

To coordinate the move with the most suitable time to prepare for concrete pouring, it appears that we will be moving the structures in March 2002. This gives us the opportunity to work harder at fund raising so that the whole project can be completed sooner and more rapidly.

September and October Meetings

Shirley Miller, a certified genealogy researcher who has written about and taught genealogy research, warned us that doing research into one's family history leads from hobby, through obsession and to incurable disease!

Speaking at our September meeting, Shirley gave us tips on a number of good resources for information, such as the State Historical Library, the State Genealogy Library, and the library of the Iowa Genealogical Society here in Des Moines. There is a Mormon Library in West Des Moines. Ellis Island records from 1892 forward are being made available on line.

County Histories, to be found in libraries, are good sources of information. Another source is cemetery records and censuses, the latter done by the WPA in the 1930's. Our historical society has contributed by enumerating the local cemeteries and placing the information in the on-line Tombstone Transcription Project.

Older tombstones are often difficult to read, so researchers have found ways to bring up and make the letters and dates readable. Shirley has found that using wide white chalk and a soft brush on the stones can help.

Shirley also gave us advice on searching Military records from the National Archives for Civil War information. County Courthouses are another important source for marriages, births, deaths, and wills. Courthouse staffs vary in the service they are willing to provide.

We heard a number of interesting stories on personal family searches, which make this kind of research so rewarding.

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After we heard from Jerry Miller, restoration painter, last spring about his work on the State Capitol building, we knew we wanted to hear more of his story, and so we invited him back to speak to us in October.

Jerry also worked on the restoration of Terrace Hill, our Governor's residence. And he brought his slides to illustrate the deterioration of the rooms over the years, the earlier repairs and modifications, and the discoveries, underneath them, of what had been the original decorative designs and colors.

The slides also showed the meticulous and careful restoration painting and use of stencils with which Jerry and his crew returned the home to its original elegance and beauty.

Pioneer Days at Horizon School

On October 8 Ferne Michael and Mary Jane Paez presented a program of information about pioneers, and Johnston pioneers in the early days of settlement here, to an enthusiastic group of students at Horizon Elementary School.

They visited Mrs. Young's first grade class, where the students had made "shoebox" log cabins. Mary Jane talked about how pioneers lived, and Ferne told the stories of her ancestors, the Hunt family, who came to Johnston in 1846.

Meet Me at the Corner.... Merle Hay and NW. 62nd Avenue

Abel Findley Rittgers was a storekeeper who sold general merchandise in a brick building which some Johnston residents will remember was located on the north-west corner of Merle Hay Road and NW 62nd Avenue (then known as Route 62). He was in business there with his brother John in 1918.

Abel was the son of early Johnston pioneer Rueben Rittgers and Abigail Findley, and was born in Grimes in 1875. Before going into the grocery business, he had been a dairy farmer.

The store building itself was a square brick structure, built close to the road, with narrow steps leading up from the street level to the door. Next to it were three "Camp Dodge" houses. (These were one-and-two room wooden cottages which were in use at Camp Dodge during WWI, and which the government sold off after the war.)

Abel, or "Uncle Fin", as he was known in the family, had put these houses together next to the store, as a residence for himself, his wife Mabel and their children.

In September of 1921, Abel Rittgers was digging a ditch for a sewer line for his house. Unfortunately, the sandy soil caved in on him as he was digging, and he was unable to climb out; when family and neighbors came to check on him, it was too late for a rescue.

His widow struggled on with grocery store to run, a partially finished home, and three small children to care for. Abel's brothers Jasper and John helped as they could.

We don't know when Mabel gave up the store, but the next tenant at the brick building was a Mr. McDermott, who operated a grocery store there until about 1951.

At that time the Elwell family took over the business in the building; later they built a new "supermarket" store across the street, on the northeast corner. In 1969 or 1970 the expanding Hy-Vee Company bought out the Elwells.

A few years later, Hy-Vee, finding this building too small, constructed a new one behind it, and then tore down the old one, leaving a large parking lot in front of what is now City Hall.

An animal-grooming establishment known as the "Dog House" opened for business in the old brick store building still standing across the street. This name persisted when later a coffeehouse for young people opened there. In the fall of 1974 the name was changed to "Desert Pete's"; the building continued as a gathering place for the youth of the community and, now sponsored by a group of local churches, it was open on weekends.

Eventually the old brick store was torn down, (possibly to widen the intersection, or when water mains were laid in 1974-5), and the lot stood vacant. A house next door, (possibly one of the Camp Dodge houses) was taken out in widening of Merle Hay. A businessman who proposed to make boat propellers there put up a building on the corner in 1987. This enterprise failed, or moved elsewhere and the "Subway" sandwich shop opened at the location.

In the spring of 2001 the "Subway" business moved to another strip mall down Merle Hay Road; the building on the corner was torn down, and this year local residents have watched the construction of a new Walgreens store where Uncle Fin's grocery once stood.

They have: Stripped out carpeting, removed tack strips and staples from floors throughout house, cleared out old appliances, cleared out old junk, attic to basement - 40 cubic yards; removed and stored antique fixtures; taken down light fixtures, dismantled wood stove in parlor; taken down brick chimney at roof line, taken down stove pipe, cut water and waste pipes in basement; cleared out basement, cleared out lath and plaster in basement between joists, taken out fixtures in both bathrooms; stripped linoleum from floors; cleared out 3 years' accumulation from vagrant living in loft of barn; cleared out 66 cubic yards of hay from barn loft; removed doors from stalls; and more, as the work continues.


