Working with the eighth grade students in successive years at the cemeteries has been wonderful. The initially reluctant students were delighted with their accomplishments and learned so much from Ferne Michael about the early families of Beaver Creek Settlement.

Because of our success with other projects, I know that we can succeed in the biggest project of all – the Simpson house and barn.

I wish that each of you could see the inside of this wonderful farmhouse. Actually, you will be able to. A new website is being developed at www.johnstonhistoricalsociety.org
We will have pictures of the inside rooms of the house. As the project develops we plan to keep every posted with updates.

Since we started talking about the museum, we have received various offers of items of historic value. We want to be able to showcase the history of our schools, businesses, city, families and individuals who have been instrumental in our development. An inscribed brick would be a wonderful way to honor family members, special events, of groups.




