Our business member Hyde Mowing & Snow Removal has installed a low voltage light system that includes a spotlight on the front and back doors, landscape lights in the south flower garden, and a spotlight on the flag. We had 35 visitors on Saturday June 16th during Johnston's Green Days Celebration.

I thank all of the volunteers that worked on the Ridgedale project for all of their work everyone did a good job thanks again.

To raise money for the field, some of the men in the community went around to the business people in Johnston and surrounding area and borrowed ten dollars from each person of which they expect to keep \$2.50 in the association for dues and pay the \$7.50 back as soon as the money is available. Through the loyalty of the business men the money was borrowed. Some of the men in the community who were not so fortunate as to have the money are doing their part by working on the field putting up poles and reflectors etc. These poles are the best in the country. They were unable to find suitable poles in Des Moines so Le Roy Schlenker hauled them from Minneapolis. Each pole weighed approximately 1,416 lbs.

Memorial Day in Johnston

The Veteran's Memorial at the Johnston Library was dedicated on Memorial Day at 10AM. The American Legion was on hand to help with the unveiling. A special thanks to Jacob Mentele. He was the one responsible for this project coming together as part of his Eagle Scout project along with the Johnston American Legion post 274. Speakers at the dedication were Mayor Paula Dierenfeld and Congressman Leonard Boswell.

On Wednesday May 30th an open house was held at the Johnston Library to show case an exhibit on Iowans who have died from wounds suffered in a war zone since September 11, 2001. The Iowa Patriot Guard was on hand displaying flags outside the library and Mike Vogt, historian at Camp Dodge, discussed Iowa Veterans with a focus on the Civil War.

A Johnston Icon

Ben Dewey

Ben Dewey was born in Pierre, South Dakota on January 12, 1886. He moved with his family in a covered wagon to Lead, South Dakota when he was only seven years old. Because his father had been an attorney for Sitting Bull and had represented the Sioux tribe in Washington, the family was given special permission to travel through the Sioux reservation on their way to Lead. He remembers seeing bands of Indians riding to the right and left of their wagon and watching their progress through the reservation . It took them six days to travel the 180 mile trip which would have taken weeks if they had been forced to circle the reservation.

Ben had some interesting experiences in his early years. He knew Sitting Bull and also delivered the morning paper to Calamity Jane. After completing high school in Lead he wanted to go to college but lacked the funds. He decided to earn his way through college by working as a reporter for the Omaha Daily News. He also worked for the Chicago Tribune, the Des Moines Daily and the Des Moines Capital. He later became a reporter and photographer for the the Register and Tribune.

In 1910 he moved to Johnston. The only house in Johnston at that time was the house that is currently known as the Stillwell house. It was difficult to work for the newspaper and live in Johnston so he gave up the newspaper job. About that time the County Supervisors needed someone to serve as secretary. He served in that position for 18 years. He later ran for the Board of Supervisors and was elected to three, six year terms. In 1946 he left the court house and went into the insurance business.

Ben was one of the founders of the Johnston Consolidated Schools and served on the school board for 20 years. Ben Dewey did so many things for the benefit of Johnston that to list them would take up more space than we have in this newsletter. Ben made many contributions to the Johnston Community. As a tribute to him there is park in Johnston named Dewey Park. It is located on land he once owned.


Mark Your Calendars
